## 1.1 – Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Kumadvathi College of Education is affiliated with Kuvempu University, Shankaraghatta, Shimoga and adheres to the curriculum prescribed by the University in an efficient way. At the beginning of the academic year, the

Principal along with the faculty members finalizes the Academic Calendar in alignment with the University calendar. Subjects are allocated to faculties based on their subject expertise and interests well in advance. Time Table for every academic year is prepared by the Time Table Committee in consultation with the Principal with even load distribution. The University provides the syllabus with evaluation schemes and objectives for every course. Action plans and assignments for each course are prepared by the respective subject in charge before the start of the new academic year. Besides traditional lectures and seminars, infrastructure for the use of ICT in classrooms, like PowerPoint presentations, smart boards and audio-visual support are all available to make the delivery of the curriculum enabling and interesting for the students. Concept Enrichment courses are held in order to make the curriculum delivery more holistic and effective. Critical thinking is encouraged through the various debates, role-playing brain stroaming approach and class discussions. The curriculum is enhanced through the conduct of assignments and field trips giving insights beyond the syllabus. The college arranges an array of cocurricular activities to enrich the curriculum. All classrooms are ICT equipped and Wi-Fi enabled. This provides for interactive classroom learning. Our college library subscribes to numerous journals so that both students and teacher educators can keep abreast of changing trends in their respective subjects. The institute also subscribes to E-journals (N-List). A record of the students using the numerous library facilities is maintained by the Librarian. The college infrastructure and facilities are continuously being upgraded to suit the needs of changing curriculum and pedagogy. Regular interaction with Student Union members with the Principal ensures that lecturers complete their portion in time and effectively. The responses gathered via the student feedback survey helps us to identify areas of improvement in curriculum delivery and evaluation methods. The progress of the student teachers is maintained through regular tests, presentations and exams. The result analysis is done after every examination and proper measures are incorporated to improve the performance by arranging remedial classes for the weaker students and giving additional assignments/tasks to the brighter students. The college has a Mentoring Programme which enables students of all years to provide feedback to teachers on the curricular issues, college infrastructure, administrative matters and other non-academic matters. The college also focuses on TET and CTET coaching classes for the students. The entire approach of the institute is student-centric.

Our college is involved in the continual mentoring of student-teachers to fulfil or deal with student diversity by conducting various curricular and co-curricular activities. The curriculum aspects in our college have given ample opportunity for student-teacher to draw out his/her potentiality by giving surveys, Assignments, Tutorial work, Micro-teaching/ Macro- teaching Article writing, working models preparation, conducting Brainstorming sessions, quiz, essays competitions and usage of ICT in teaching-learning process etc. our college has organized basis for various activities related to the singing, group dance, Drawing skill, Rangoli competitions and also organised various awareness programmes like women empowerment, No tobacco day, Plantation programmes which are helpful for the professional development of student-teacher. At the beginning of the academic year, the B.Ed first year and second-year students are divided into groups and one mentor teacher was assigned the responsibility of mentoring one group at the ratio of 1:10. There will be two mentoring classes each week as per the regular timetable. The mentor teachers spend quality time with the mentees by having informal interactions with regard to their personal and academic problems both individually and collectively. The mentees were given proper guidance and counselling by the mentors. Also, the Institute periodically conducts sessions, workshops and seminars on personality development, self-confidence, soft skills, social skills, stress management, anger management, coping mechanisms, public speaking, resilience, emotional health and well-being, personal hygiene, emotional hygiene and so on. These are conducted to empower the students and help them to achieve their highest potential and perform to the best of their abilities. #### 2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

The college follows the CIE norms prescribed by the affiliating university (Kuvempu University), being a non-autonomous college. The college conducts CIE periodically for the theoretical aspects of pedagogical and educational subjects. Accordingly, every B.Ed student has to take written tests, assignments and seminars. In practical aspects of the B.Ed curriculum, the teacher educators are continuously assessing the students' performance from the beginning till the end of the academic year by using the available structured evaluation proforma. The reforms which were initiated have been listed below comprehensively. A) Following Curricular activities has been organized for the fulfilment of internal assessments: 1. Assignment / Practicum work was given related to the pedagogical and environment courses. 2. Organising Seminar/PPT for the student teachers pertaining to their subjects. 3. Tutorial works like Question and Answers session, Remedial Teaching and discussion ....etc activities were designed related to their pedagogical subjects. 4. Preparation of learning aids. 5. Scheduled two-week internships for the First, second and third semesters. In the second Semester students has to practice micro-teaching for 10 days. 6. Internship Programme: 20 weeks internship activity organized for 4th-semester students. The internship provides a rich and comprehensive experience to students. It gives them an opportunity to experience school settings from the administrative and teaching perspective. It gives the students a first-hand experience of the actual teaching-learning environment and the challenges therein. It trains them to enhance their skills. 7. Mentoring of student teachers throughout the course is done by all teacher educators. 8. Conducting periodical tests. 9. Case Studies, Writing Academic Papers, Bulletin-Board Displays, Concept/ Mind Maps, Tutorials/ Content/ Modules, Remedial Teaching, Action Research Projects, Discussions, Quizzes, Debates, Role-Plays, Designing Models, Designing Instructional Materials and Resources, Power-Point Presentations, Experiments etc. Classroom Interaction Cocurricular activities: Teachers also verify the students through numerous mechanisms along with ordinary interaction with college students, Co-Curricular Activities, Talent Search Programme Organization of CTC, SUPW, activity, Sports Activity and Educational Tour -etc organized and monitored the role of each student-teacher an all the activities throughout the course as a part of internal assessments by giving grades to the CCA and Marks to the periodical tests by following the universities rule and regulations related to internal evaluation. In all these situations how student-teachers reacts and faces the situations will be observed by the teacher educators and help them to assess the student's continuously in a judicial manner.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The Academic Calendar gives an overall picture of the activities for the entire academic year. The college considers the academic calendar as an integral part of the functioning of the Institute. Curriculum Development	The curriculum transaction like teaching, learning and evaluation schedules is strict as per the Academic calendar notified by the University. The College is affiliated with Kuvempu University, Shankaraghatta, Shivamogga. The academic curriculum is designed by the Board of Studies (BOS) of the concerned Dept. of Studies of Kuvempu University, Shankaraghatta. BOS designed syllabus, teaching hours panel of examiners. Objectives of the Practice: To achieve the vision to create a centre of academic excellence in education the institution follows an integrated system that includes the teaching-learning methods, Mentoring, inculcating Skills and Career Guidance which helps in the overall development of the student. a) To instil a sense of social responsibility in the minds of the students. b) To engage the students in meaningful service that meets community needs. c) To equip the students with skills, attitude and knowledge so that they can work for the deprived sections of society. d) To prepare effective teacher educators for society. 3. The Context: The main aim of the institution is to provide an education that helps in the overall development of the individual and prepares productive and effective teachers for society. The system followed here helps one to develop leadership qualities, provides exposure to gain knowledge through different teaching-learning methods and are given opportunities to explore in their respective fields. Mentoring means keeping track of the day to day activities of the student teachers and their behaviour inside and outside the class, which helps to guide them and motivate them. The Career Guidance and Placement cell facilitate the process of placement of students graduating from the institution. Students are trained with Skills for adaptive and positive behaviour that enable individuals to deal effectively with the demands and challenges of everyday.. 4. The Practice: a) Mentoring: Kumadvathi College of education activities in the professional development among the student-teacher from the establishment of the college. Our college is involved in the continual mentoring of student-teachers to fulfil or deal with student diversity by conducting various curricular and cocurricular activities. At the beginning of the academic year, the B.Ed first year and secondyear students are divided into groups and one mentor teacher was assigned the responsibility of mentoring one group at the ratio of 1:10. There will be two mentoring classes each week as per the regular timetable. The mentor teachers spend quality time with the mentees by having informal interactions with regard to their personal and academic problems both individually and collectively. The mentees were given proper guidance and counselling by the mentors. Also, the Institute periodically conducts sessions, workshops and seminars on personality development, self-confidence, soft skills, social skills, stress management, anger management, coping mechanisms, public speaking, resilience, emotional health and well-being, personal hygiene, emotional hygiene and so on. These are conducted to empower the students and help them to achieve their highest potential and perform to the best of their abilities. The mentors regularly oversee and coordinate student mentoring sessions, behavioural monitoring,

availability of sufficient learning resources, marks obtained in Continuous Internal Assessment, attendance, discipline, grievances, learning difficulties, scholarships, etc. The mentoring mechanism and the measures taken for promoting the welfare of the mentees had been recorded in the mentoring books maintained by the mentors. Above mentioned all the programmes (Curricular and Cocurricular) activities conducted organized and monitored continually by our teacher - Educators and Principal for developing professional attitudes in students. b) Teaching-Learning Methods: Methods such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving are used to enhance learning opportunities for the students. Experiential Learning Methodologies followed in the Institution are learning through projects and Internships. Students actively participate in the extension activities and gain knowledge.
